2	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Good morning. I'd like
3	to call to order the meeting of the Chicago
4	Transit Board for October 9th, 2024.
5	Georgette, please call the roll.

22	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Our next order of
23	business is the approval of the minutes of the
24	regular Board meeting of September 11th, 2024.

1	May I have a motion it to approve?
2	DIRECTOR LEE: So moved.
3	DIRECTOR ORTIZ: Second.
4	MS. GREENLEE: It's been moved by Director
5	Lee, seconded by Director Ortiz that minutes from
6	September 11th, 2024 with be approved.
7	We'll take a roll call vote.
8	Director Eaddy.
9	DIRECTOR EADDY: Yes.
10	MS. GREENLEE: Director Lee.
11	DIRECTOR LEE: Abstain because I wasn't
12	here.
13	MS. GREENLEE: Director Jakes.
14	DIRECTOR JAKES: Yes.

23	MS. GREENLEE: Chairman Barclay, the
24	motion passes.

1	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Our next item of
2	business on the agenda will be the ADA Advisory
3	Board report given by Laura Saltzman, who is the
4	chair of the ADA Advisory Board.
5	MS. SALTZMAN: Thank you for having me.
6	Sorry. I know I speak quietly, so I want you to
7	hear.
8	Hello. My name is Laura Saltzman. I am
9	the chair of the ADA Advisory Committee and a
10	senior policy analyst at Access Living.
11	The Committee met this past Monday on
12	October 7th, 2024. We welcomed the new ADA
13	Advisory Committee Vice Chairman Lincoln Edwards
14	and thank Cindy Fosco for her past work as vice
15	chair. We also want to chair Chairman Lester
16	Barclay for moving this process through so
17	quickly. We had public comment.
18	MS. GREENLEE: Ms. Saltzman, thank you so
19	much for being here. So we're just going to level
20	set. Please do pull the mic closer and maybe Veda
21	can help you. Please slow down. Your words are
22	being transcribed and I want to make sure that our
23	court reporter gets all of the names and the words
24	as you're giving your report.

1	Thank you very much.
2	MS. SALTZMAN: Thank you so much. I'm so
3	sorry. Do you want me to start
4	MS. GREENLEE: You can keep going from
5	where you just left off.
6	MS. SALTZMAN: Sorry. I'm also losing my
7	voice.
8	We had the public comment encouraging CTA
9	to consider which standards it follows related to
10	elevator design and whether those current designs
11	follow best practices.
12	We then had three presentations discussing
13	infrastructure improvements on the CTA, which were
14	an update to the All Stations Accessibility
15	Program, the Red Line Extension, RLE, and future
16	phases of the Red/Purple Modernization project.
17	Bill Mooney, chief infrastructure officer,
18	presented on ASAP and RLE. During his
19	presentations, the Committee brought up concerns
20	regarding the decision of having one escalator
21	that goes only one direction particularly in areas
22	with wide staircases. Mr. Mooney stated it is due
23	to budget and area constraints as some stations
24	can only fit one escalator.

The Committee also brought up the cost difference between outsourcing versus in-house workers for various infrastructure projects and whether there are times where in-house would save money long time. Mr. Mooney said that it depends on the project. Some engineering is internal, but something like elevator replacement CTA currently outsources and that works well, however, that there were some kinds of elevator repairs that the agency handles in-house.

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In addition, the Committee stated that accessing the surrounding area to the stations is just as important. The Committee asked whether the pathway to the station would also be improved. As the Board may recall, pathway of travel is of particular concern for this Committee. Mr. Mooney stated that CTA collaborates with CDOT and is a part of ASAP to look at the surrounding area for accessibility updates.

For the Red Line Extension, the Committee asked whether CTA had plans to increase bus service for the areas that the extension will be targeting ahead of when it -- decisions to be built, whether there were environment concerns

1	with the noise levels of the Red Line Extension
2	stations, and asked if CTA will help advocate for
3	accessible housing in developments around these
4	new accessible Red Line Extension stations as this
5	is something that CTA desperately lacks and as
6	promoting the need in general for developments
7	around the stations is something that CTA is
8	doing.
9	Christina Bader, the project manager in
10	strategic planning, presented the future phases of
11	the Red/Purple Modernization project. The
12	Committee expressed gratitude of RPM's public
13	engagement efforts and expressed a desire to have
14	more projects have the same level of public
15	engagement. I genuinely think this would benefit
16	everyone.
17	Thee are a number of people who
18	effectively to a committee of mostly
19	nontransportation professional and explain why
20	various decisions related to accessibility are
21	made. That is something for the CTA to take
22	advantage of.
23	The Committee asked to prioritize
24	accessibility at the Central Purple Line station

1 because there is a hospital within close proximity 2 to the station. Furthermore, Irma Gomez, ADA manager, will 3 4 be recruiting new ADA Advisory Committee members 5 as two of our longstanding members, Doreen Bogus 6 and Mary Abramson, will complete a four-year term 7 in January. The application can be found online 8 and the deadline is November 8th. 9 In addition, the Committee was made aware 10 that today MOPD will be hosting and employment networking event for people with disabilities in 11 12 which the CTA will be present. The event will take place at the MOPD's Central West Community 13 Center located at 2102 West Ogden from 1:30 to 14 15 4:00. I appreciate that the CTA is doing this and 16 encourage other agencies to also seek out disabled 17 employees. In a tight labor market, this is a 18 labor pool getting overlooking. 19 Additionally, we raised the issue of BRT, 20 a continuation of our last presentation to this 2.1 Board, which we appreciated the response to. 22 is also due to a conversation I had with 23 Rep. Eva-Dina Delgado at another time in which she

expressed a willingness to press the State or

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1	IDOT. This is a response to a conversation I had
2	with Rep. Delgado in which she expressed a
3	willingness to press the State or IDOT
4	specifically on BRT but that CTA needs to have an
5	explicit plan for BRT.
6	Molly Poppe said plans are in the works to
7	explore this beyond the Better Streets for Buses
8	project on Western specifically. I think we
9	should take advantage of state legislators who are
10	eager to support transit projects. We also
11	discussed the need for career CSRs and CSAs at
12	stations and crisis response teams.
13	Infrastructure cannot solve all disability
14	concerns, but we sincerely appreciate the
15	commitment to infrastructure that CTA has made
16	both locally and in making Federal ASAP happen. I
17	do want to thank CTA for not only showing up at a
18	recent meeting that Access Living held on crisis
19	response teams but having by far the best
20	representation of any agency, state or local,
21	including those that were mandated to attend.
22	I encourage it to further progress on
23	plans for careers CSAs and CSRs and, finally,
24	crisis response.

1	Finally, we ask for a process that would
2	flag if certain garages or stations consistently
3	have more complaints as that would point to a more
4	systemic issue that would need to be resolved
5	beyond the infrastructure level.
6	Our next meeting is January 13th. Thank
7	you.
8	MS. GREENLEE: Thank you, Mrs. Saltzman.
9	Are there any questions of the Board for
10	the chairperson of the ADA Advisory Committee?
11	DIRECTOR JHA: Can I go first?
12	MS. GREENLEE: Absolutely, Director Jha.
13	DIRECTOR JHA: Are there any immediate
14	action items that the CTA has agreed to take on
15	based on your recommendations? And you may not
16	know the answer. But do we have anything from the
17	CTA team based off of what we've heard? Were
18	there actionable things that we can take on that
19	was not in the plan before?
20	MS. SALTZMAN: Specifically related to
21	what I just talked about?
22	DIRECTOR JHA: Mm-hmm.
23	MS. SALTZMAN: Our meeting was Monday.
24	DIRECTOR JHA: Was there any agreement to

1	was there any response from the team in terms
2	of if there are any projects that they can take on
3	that was not in the plan we don't have to
4	answer that question now. But I'd like the team
5	to come back with that.
6	And then second is how are we
7	incorporating some of what we've heard in the
8	upcoming budget ask that is going to happen in
9	November?
10	MS. SALTZMAN: Yeah. That is I think for
11	the
12	DIRECTOR JHA: Yeah. So that would be the
13	two questions back to the CTA team in terms of
14	what we've heard if we can get some response to
15	that.
16	MS. LEERHSEN: We'd be happy to provide
17	that.
18	DIRECTOR JHA: Awesome. Thank you.
19	MS. SALTZMAN: Yeah. Thank you.
20	MS. GREENLEE: Director Requejo.
21	DIRECTOR REQUEJO: Similar point. Similar
22	point around taking advantage of the budget season
23	to take on some of these issues. Also, curious as
24	to whenever we run into this whole we don't have

1	the budget situation, how do we break that wall?
2	This is very expensive work and we need to figure
3	out a way, state legislators, what would help us
4	with this.
5	And then, more specifically, Laura, has
6	the team thought about identifying some of the, I
7	don't know, top ten locations that are the hardest
8	to access for people with disabilities that we can
9	use as a first step to start addressing those
10	issues that affect, as you have very well educated
11	all of us, not only the disability community but
12	people who are trying to cross the street who will
13	benefit probably tremendously from those
14	collaborations between CDOT and CTA?
15	MS. SALTZMAN: So I know that and I
16	think I discussed this before that CTA has
17	handed CDOT the list of the most in need bus stops
18	in regards to CTA stations. Again, I gather that
19	there is specific focus especially around ASAP and
20	I know CTA sometimes lays down new sidewalk for
21	the RPM project.
22	But I think that but in terms of the
23	top ten I mean, the thing is, is how do we
24	evaluate the top ten, is it the area that doesn't

already have accessibility? I mean, we can 1 2 prioritize where they are -- and it's how far are 3 we going for path of travel. But I think there 4 could be further discussions. But especially I 5 would want a commitment if CTA could help get a 6 commitment from CDOT that if that work is done, 7 there will be follow through on that because I 8 think that that has sometimes been one of the 9 issues. 10 DIRECTOR REQUEJO: Right. Yeah. acknowledge there are many factors. So I was 11 12 curious as to whether the Committee has identified how would you prioritize, are these areas with the 13 most disabilities that live there, are these areas 14 15 that have the most traffic violence, whatever that 16 is? 17 To me, what would be helpful -- I've seen 18 really great, by the way, examples of improvements 19 in walkability happening around some stations, 20 especially on the north side. I don't see that 2.1 happening equitably. And it feels like one-offs 22 that happen when there is pressure from the 23 alderman and a number of things that can be 2.4 orchestrated.

1	So, to me, the question is how can we
2	build on those lessons learned. And congrats to
3	those folks who have created walkability, but then
4	can we develop a pipeline of stations that then go
5	next that doesn't end up just benefitting one area
6	that looks at places with traffic violence and
7	seniors or people with disabilities living nearby.
8	I don't know. Just curious as to whether you'll
9	have a conversation on that.
10	MS. SALTZMAN: I think it would be a good
11	conversation to have and add it to our agenda to
12	discuss have the full Committee discuss it.
13	Our next meeting is January.
14	But we've had those discussions in terms
15	of prioritizing whether or not you consider a bus
16	stop accessible because there is various metrics
17	for that. So there was just a discussion for
18	that. So I think that would be good.
19	But, yes, for instance, on Cermak, they
20	fixed all the sidewalks east of it but not west.
21	You have sidewalks that have stairs, so it's not
22	accessible. So I agree with you.
23	I think yeah. I think while we've had
24	one-off discussions, having a full discussion

1	would be good. We meet quarterly, so the next one
2	will be January, but I think that that would be
3	something to put on the agenda and ask CTA to help
4	us kind of think about the evaluation in terms of
5	in the same ways that ASAP was considered.
6	DIRECTOR REQUEJO: Great. Yeah. Because
7	I've seen the pipeline for the transformation of
8	stations into accessible stations and I applaud
9	the efforts of the infrastructure team to do this,
10	but I haven't seen the same type of pipeline on
11	prioritization of the actual walkability and
12	mobility of stations.
13	MS. SALTZMAN: The other thing, I think,
14	that it would be worth thinking about is there are
15	still some parts of the city that don't have
16	sidewalks where there are buses and don't have
17	sidewalks.
18	And, I know, again, this gets into the
19	issue of what CTA can do versus what other
20	agencies can do, but, certainly, if CTA can help
21	push for that. I think it's unacceptable that
22	there are areas not just where the sidewalk is
23	broken but where there's no sidewalk or there's no
24	curb ramps or sidewalks, sometimes. Would that

1	also kind of be in line with what you're looking
2	at, too?
3	DIRECTOR REQUEJO: Yeah. And it kind of
4	brings it into the whole CDOT/CTA partnership,
5	which I know is in the works to have something
6	more coordinated, but I would welcome also an
7	update on how is our partnership with CDOT being
8	reinforced and more strategic things like
9	pipelines on projects, things like that.
10	MS. GREENLEE: Director Ortiz.
11	DIRECTOR ORTIZ: Thank you.
12	These analyses take time and thought
13	process and I know sometimes capacity can be an
14	issue. So leaning on the partners, I think, would
15	be a really good ask of just how do we even do an
16	analysis of the stations or the investments.
17	And I would further that into a return on
18	investment analysis, right? If you're investing
19	in this route or if you're investing in this other
20	piece, how much and how much better can an
21	investment on buses might have a better return
22	versus one station and one location and all of the
23	logistics that go into building permits and costs.
24	So I would just encourage and provide that

1	as another piece of support, coordination to think
2	through this.
3	MS. SALTZMAN: I agree. It's very
4	important. And there are some folks that do that.
5	That would be a necessary part of the
6	conversation. I appreciate it.
7	MS. GREENLEE: Director Jakes.
8	DIRECTOR JAKES: No questions.
9	MS. GREENLEE: Director Lee.
10	DIRECTOR LEE: Hi, Laura. Thanks for the
11	report and the summary. I guess I'm wondering
12	is this a question for Nora. Can we hold a spot
13	for CDOT at their committee, like an invitation?
14	It sounds like there's a lot of, you know,
15	disconnect.
16	MS. LEERHSEN: Yeah. I don't think
17	there's anything precluding that. You mean just
18	having them visit to speak to the committee?
19	DIRECTOR LEE: Just a standing invitation
20	where they should probably show up. Is there that
21	possibility?
22	MS. LEERHSEN: I'm sure that's a
23	possibility.
24	DIRECTOR LEE: Because I would encourage

1	that. It sounds like there's a lot of overlap.
2	It just keeps getting brought up, not really
3	solved. Otherwise, I mean, I commend the work
4	that you all are doing. Keep it up.
5	MS. GREENLEE: Director Eaddy.
6	DIRECTOR EADDY: No questions.
7	MS. GREENLEE: Thank you, Ms. Saltzman.
8	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Our next order of
9	business is public comment. Georgette.
10	MS. GREENLEE: Chairman Barclay, we had
11	five registered citizens for public comments
12	today. Four have actually shown up. And we will
13	call them in order.
14	Thank you for coming to make public
15	comments. I would advise that your comments must
16	be kept at three minutes. And we will advise you
17	if you are going over or approaching that
18	three-minute mark.
19	Our first public commentator is Pennie
20	McCoach. Welcome. Please speak loudly. Pull the
21	microphone up.
22	MS. MCCOACH: Good morning, everyone. My
23	name is Pennie McCoach. I'm the president and
24	business agent for ATU Local 308 and I represent

1 the rail side of the employees for the Chicago
2 Transit Authority.

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I'm here today on behalf of the members of ATU Local 308, the hardworking people who operate CTA rail system 365 days a year. Unlike the transit system in many major cities who have dedicated transit police, the CTA system is patrolled by unarmed private security companies.

As recent events show, that is not an effective deterrent to crime on the CTA. In just the last few weeks, our members have endured a series of violent incidents for passengers shot on the Blue Line, one of our local 308 members shot and wounded in a drive-by shooting at the Howard Station, and just this past week, a customer was shot on the Red Line. And not to mention, I think think just this week there was an incident with a shooting on the buses where a passenger was shot in the leg.

And these are just the latest incidents that has occurred on the system. These things are unacceptable. CTA must take steps to provide meaningful deterrents to crime on the system such as working with the City to institute a dedicated

1	transit police force.
2	I heard you guys speaking about that
3	today. I appreciate you bringing that into
4	conversation today. CTA must also take meaningful
5	steps to improve the quality of life for our
6	members because not only do our members face
7	unacceptable danger at work, but they also face
8	unacceptable working conditions.
9	CTA often says that it places their
10	highest priority on providing a safe and healthy
11	environment for their employees and the riding
12	public. We don't feel that way. Those are nice
13	words, but our members expect action, not words
14	from CTA. And it's time for CTA to take action on
15	behalf of the members of Local 308, 241, and the
16	riding public.
17	That's all I have. Thank you.
18	MS. GREENLEE: Thank you, Ms. McCoach.
19	Our next public comment is from Bill
20	Morton of the Rogers Park Chamber of Commerce.
21	MR. MORTON: Thank you, Board, vice
22	president, and staff for giving me the opportunity
23	to represent our constituents in Rogers Park and
24	the City of Chicago.

We met with Infrastructure Officer Bill Mooney and RPM Jeff Wilson on several occasions about two different things. One is filling the empty storefronts at the CTA properties over in the Rogers Park area and also on Howard Street, the Evanston side. There are about 13 to 15 different empty storefronts there.

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And as was mentioned before, there's a lot of violence going on on Morse and Howard right now. And we feel that filling these empty storefronts will really help on that end. Having more people there to do actually business and to shop would really help our community. And this is what our constituents really want and need and that's why we had that meeting.

Also, another meeting -- we also got to tour -- tour the storefronts. And our action plan is to contact business owners throughout the City of Chicago and suburbs to become new Rogers Park business owners at these locations. We understand that they're in poor shape and that they need a lot of renovation. We took a look in there. But we're working with Bill Mooney and Jeff Wilson on that. And that's where we're at with that.

1	Next, I stated it before, we will always
2	advocate for making Morse and Jarvis Red Line
3	Stations ADA accessible. Don't have elevators.
4	We don't have escalators. And if we're going to
5	pick some, I would suggest you pick Morse and
6	Jarvis stations. I'd be happy to meet with the
7	ADA Committee. I haven't yet. But now that I
8	know it exists, I'll come over. I will go out
9	there and do what it takes to advocate for people
10	with disabilities and also to advocate for
11	families with strollers because that's just
12	dangerous. I see it happen on Jarvis all the
13	time. And people with groceries. So that's the
14	top of our list.
15	Also, one of our constituents who is
16	present in the council chambers right now is Adam
17	Mack. And he calls us all the time. He's always
18	messaging us with all of these different issues.
19	I just want to focus on public health and
20	public safety while I have a little bit of time
21	left. There are people who are treating the CTA
22	trains, particularly the Red and Blue Line, as a
23	domicile. And I feel that this is a public health
24	and a public safety issue. Now, we must be

1	compassionate, of course. But I don't believe
2	I've seen in the CTA mission statement that you
3	guys supply housing.
4	I would like to see the CTA and maybe
5	you already have, but I'd like to see the CTA work
6	with the homeless shelters within the City of
7	Chicago and surrounding suburbs, including
8	connections with the homeless and others to get
9	these people temporary housing so they don't have
10	to be on the train
11	MS. GREENLEE: That's time.
12	MR. MORTON: So they know that have that
13	option.
14	Thank you very much. Thank you.
15	MS. GREENLEE: Our next public commentator

1 the Board and suggested that the bus stops get bus 2 trackers, which later came in 2011 after I saw it 3 in London. So never got a thank you, but, anyway. 4 I've been riding the transit a lot this 5 summer when my car has been down, so I just want 6 to say a few things, some things that have been 7 said already. But the Red Line, I shouldn't have 8 to get a contact high every time I get on the Red 9 Line. And there is always somebody smoking weed, 10 somebody selling weed like it's a regular business 11 without any kind of fear. 12 When I used to be high school as a bad kid, we always feared doing anything on the 13 14 trains. But now they operate with no fear. Ι 15 suggested before this Board years ago after 16 attending a convention in St. Louis involving 17 transportation -- they had an armed security quard 18 on every train that went into the city. Not 19 security guards that can't do nothing without 20 being armed. They had armed security. We need 2.1 armed security on these trains. And they had it 22 on every train that I rode into St. Louis. 23 Also, shields. I was the one who 24 originally suggested putting the shields on the

1 But they need to protect the bus driver buses. 2 totally like they do in South Africa and London. 3 Totally in a cage with the side door that the 4 operators can use. 5 Also, turnstiles. I've been told from 6 operators telling they don't come back. People 7 are just riding the buses not paying, groups of 8 teens taking over the trains, taking over because 9 you can to the put them off for not paying their 10 bus fare anymore from what I've been told. 11 But in Brazil, Rio de Janeiro, I think I 12 brought this up before in 2016, they have turnstiles. You're not going to get on the bus 13 14 for free because you have to get past the 15 turnstile in Rio de Janeiro. They might want to 16 look at that. 17 Another one more thing -- two more things. 18 Two-sided bus stops at four-way intersection. I'm catching the bus, I shouldn't have to wait 19 20 till the bus makes the far side stop just to walk four lanes back to catch another bus. 2.1 22 should be a bus on both sides of the street such as on Garfield and Ashland. 2.3 2.4 Also, for the newcomers, one of my parent

1 -- I work with a lot of newcomer kids, I'm also in 2 CPS, one parent is scared for their kids to get 3 ride transit. They're scared they'll get lost and 4 lose communications. Please allow the operators 5 to be able to use their Google Translate if they 6 chose to without worried about getting fired for 7 pulling out a cell phone in case they need 8 somebody to talk to. 9 And the last thing. I know they've got 10 special part-timers. But special part-timers have to work on Sundays. Some of us would come back if 11 12 we didn't have to work on Sundays. That's something you might want to bring in as well. And 13 that's it. 14 15 MS. GREENLEE: Thank you, Mr. Kysel. 16 our last public comment is from Keith Hill from 17 Union 241. 18 MR. HILL: Good morning, everyone. My 19 name is Keith Hill. I actually want to thank you 20 for the opportunity to give public comments, but 2.1 I'm looking for engagement. So I hope after my 22 comment that I will have the opportunity to meet 23 with the Board and express with the concerns of my 24 members, the safety and the overall job. I'm

1 looking -- this is an olive branch. 2 My name is Keith Hill. I am president of 3 ATU Local 241. More than being a president of 4 Local 241, I have been an employee for the CTA for 5 the past 27 years working as a driver out of 6 Chicago, Forest Glenn, North Park, Archer, and 7 74the Street Garage. 8 More over, the CTA has not just been an 9 employer providing me a job, it's been an integral 10 of my up bringing, the culture, with my mother 11 having worked at CTA for 32 years and me having 12 aunties, uncles, and cousins working at the CTA. When I retire, I will be the 27th member of my 13 family to retire from CTA. 14 15 I grew up at the dinner table hearing 16 about transit issues and the importance of transit 17 in my community. Also, that working for CTA was 18 more than a job, but it was a profession that provided necessary services to the community as an 19 20 important -- as any professional. It was also mentioned that without an 2.1 22 effective massive transit system, people in the 23 community would suffer because -- and be unable to 24 provide for their daily needs. The majority of

1 the people living in the city are entirely 2 dependent upon the system to get to work as well 3 as to get to shopping and hospitals and other 4 areas as it's their only means of transportation. 5 I grew up hearing that people who work for 6 the system are responsible for making this a 7 first-class transit system, as it is the employees 8 who interact with the everyday riding public. 9 It's from this perspective I'm addressing 10 you today. Today's system is facing a huge problem, not are there only funding problems, but 11 12 there are everyday operational issues and a huge issue affecting my members, your employees, who 13 are facing rising violence directed towards them 14 15 each and every day. And I am advised by my 16 members that someone with a gun approaches them on 17 a bus on the regular each and every day. I learned of an incident or accident 18 19 committed by an employee who should have been 20 trained properly to avoid the issue but was not. 2.1 We have more and more people who are new to the 22 City of Chicago expect and demand a free ride on 23 the transit system. These are the confrontations

on the system, yet, as a recurrent, these issues

24

1 are -- and as much as they are directed to 2 management, if they are not considered important 3 by the individual manager, they are ignored. 4 I have attempted to take the cooperative 5 approach to the CTA by recognizing the interests 6 of my members are the talent and success of CTA, 7 however, I fear this is a one-way street with the 8 input of the employees who have been in the system 9 for years being ignored. 10 Much of management have taken that they run the world, that they are untouchable, and they 11 12 are protected no matter how they act. That's their solution. Their decisions and their 13 14 approaches are only the correct ones while 15 ignoring any suggestions who deal with the issues 16 on a daily basis. 17 I have worked and operated a bus for 18 decades. I have instructed employees for decades. And I know the right approach to train and how to 19 avoid and address issues, concerns of the public. 20 2.1 The fact that incidents keep growing, new 22 employees going through the system keep making the 23 same mistakes which the past employees did not

2.4

make.

1	The fact the passenger dissatisfaction
2	is growing. The fact the violence on the
3	system against operators keeps growing. And most
4	importantly, some of the most significant issues
5	my members or your employees face has not been
6	addressed. This shows that this one-way street
7	approach is not working.
8	When incidents occur, there are training
9	deficiencies, which are obviously or where
10	there are complaints from passengers is no longer
11	the answers. Why do not new employees not stay?
12	Why do new employees have accidents and not follow
13	basic protocols in driving a bus? What are the
14	problems and instructions? How to improve the
15	customer employee satisfaction?
16	These are issues that can be resolved, but
17	it takes a two-way street. The Union has already
18	committed to management to help address the
19	funding problem, but even finding solutions of the
20	problems does not address some of the most
21	significant underlying issues that must be cured
22	to make CTA a world-class transportation system.
23	It has been it has the potential to be
24	it is no longer time for lip service. It's

time for actions. We are at a critical. We can either approach these problems as partners or as adversaries. And to simply say, it is not the fault of the employee. The underlying cause must be examined. Unless the approach changes, the problems will not be resolved.

The only way to address current issues is to develop a partnership with the Union to address these issues, which, in my mind, means that management should recognize that management does not have all the solutions and it's not always the fault of the employees.

It is time for management to recognize those who interact on the daily basis with the public, drive and maintain these buses, teach new employees, coach current employees, and those who keep the system moving care about their jobs and have answers to solutions. Many of the problems the system faces should be listened to. Their input is important.

The Union prefers a partnership. It is not the question whether the person at the top or at the same page but whether it is understood at all levels that not one person at one other level

1	of management believes that they are immune. It
2	is time for the Board to recognize that the direct
3	that directing a partnership be forged. It is
4	important issues
5	MS. GREENLEE: Mr. Hill, could you please
6	begin wrapping up your comments? Thank you.
7	MR. HILL: I will as they ensure the
8	CTA achieves what it is capable of.
9	It is time for the Board to issue a
10	directive so no one at any level of management
11	believe that they are exempt. Only in this way
12	are the issues, concerns to the Union and CTA
13	truly will be truly addressed.
14	Action is required and needed to support
15	the Board. The issues are important and we must
16	find solutions together or there will be or
17	there will not be solutions and the transit system
18	that we represent will continue to burn and
19	crumble. I'm asking the Board to have a meeting
20	with the Union and let's see if we can help get us
21	back on track.
22	Before I leave, Director Lee, I on
23	behalf of my members, I understand that you take
24	the bus on the regular. I understand that you

1	have been left numerous times. That is a direct
2	conversation of what I'm talking about. The
3	training, the attitude has to change. But when I
4	go to make these suggestions, it falls on deaf
5	ears and nothing gets done or retaliation goes
6	back on the Union. So I'm asking everyone, come
7	join us, come partner with us, take the system.
8	The safety you heard today is a joke, is a
9	joke. There is no safety for us. And I'm
10	disappointed that all I heard was the rails.
11	Because for the last 50 years of my data, it's the
12	buses that kept this system running. During
13	COVID, it was the buses that kept this system
14	running.
15	MS. GREENLEE: Thank you, Mr. Hill.
16	MR. HILL: Don't disrespect the buses.
17	Acknowledge us, pay attention, come talk to us.
18	MS. GREENLEE: Thank you.
19	MR. HILL: Thank you.
20	DIRECTOR JAKES: Mr. Hill, one, it was
21	great meeting you last month. Question. Do you
22	have a list of everything you talked about?
23	MR. HILL: Yes.
24	DIRECTOR JAKES: Is there any way you can

1 get that to the Board Office so that we can have a 2 copy of it? If we can start there as well as Ms. 3 McCoach, right? Same thing. I want to lay eyes 4 on it. 5 MR. HILL: It would be an honor and 6 Thank you. pleasure. 7 MS. MCCOACH: No problem. We'll get that 8 to you. 9 CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Thank you to our public 10 comment. Thank you very much. 11 Our next item of business on the agenda is 12 our president's report. As you know, President Carter is ill, under the weather today and so 13 Chief of Staff Nora Leerhsen is sitting in for 14 15 him. 16 Thank you, Nora. She'll give his report. 17 Thank you. 18 MS. LEERHSEN: Thank you, Mr. Chairman, members of the Board. Good morning. 19 We are excited to announce the launch of 20 2.1 the planning process for CTA's first ever 22 agency-wide strategic plan. This initiative is 23 entitled Powering Our Transit Future and it will 24 provide CTA with a detailed vision and roadmap

1 towards establishing the world-class transit 2 system our customers deserve. 3 Our planning process, which will be guided 4 by community and rider input, has three central 5 First, we want to develop a coordinated 6 proactive framework for decision making, policy 7 development, and strategic investments. 8 Second, we want to articulate a clear, 9 direct vision for our riders, employees, elected officials, and other stakeholders on future 10 11 investments and objectives for transit in the 12 region. And, finally, we want to establish specific outcomes and metrics for progress guided 13 by principles of equity, sustainability, 14 15 accessibility, and rider and employee experience. But we don't do this alone. The most 16 17 critical component of this process will be the 18 input and feedback from the communities we serve, the customers who ride our system, and other 19 20 stakeholders from across the city who want to 2.1 engage with us and provide their thoughts 22 regarding CTA's operational and funding 2.3 priorities. 2.4 You may wonder why CTA is developing this

1	type of plan at this moment. President Carter
2	believes that as we drive progress on CTA's
3	immediate priorities for frequent, reliable, and
4	safe transit service, we must also lay the
5	groundwork for the agency's long term future.
6	To fulfill our commitment to this great
7	city, CTA must remain a customer-focused
8	organization, an agency that works closely with
9	the community and an employer that makes
10	investments in its workers.
11	We are excited to collaborate with all of
12	our stakeholders to create a comprehensive,
13	equitable plan that will allow us to provide
14	world-class transit service for all Chicagoans.
15	And I apologize for my voice. But you do
16	see that our strategic plan is aimed at much of
17	the spirit that was discussed today in terms of
18	input across the Board and these issues.
19	Lastly, President Carter also asked that I
20	provide a brief note about CTA's fiscal year 2025
21	proposed budget recommendation, which will be
22	unveiled for your consideration this Friday.
23	While the proposed budget specifics will
24	be made specific at that time, he has asked me to

1 advise the Board that it is a balanced spending 2 plan that puts our customers, improved service, and transit equity first. 3 Notably, this budget will maintain fares 4 5 and enhance service. Each new budget year 6 warrants a look back at the year that has passed 7 and we are very proud of CTA's performance in 8 2024. Of particular note is that CTA is already 9 either approaching, meeting, or, in some cases, 10 exceeding 2019 levels across key metrics including 11 workforce and service performance. 12 This summer, the number of full-time CTA bus operators employed by CTA reached 2019 levels 13 and today it exceeds that level. That has allowed 14 15 us to, again, put the kind of bus service our 16 customers deserve first. 17 In addition, we are making great strides toward President Carter's promised goal of 18 training 200 new rail operators this year, which 19 will ensure that we turn to 2019 service levels 20 2.1 for rail as well. 22 Chief among the proposed 2025 budget 23 priorities is an increased investment that will 2.4 help us provide service levels that exceed

1	prepandemic levels. This will be made possible
2	primarily through the system investments outlined
3	in our Bus Vision Plan, which is helping us to
4	reimagine our bus network.
5	We are also focused on making investments
6	that will provide a clean and welcoming
7	environment throughout our system. To achieve
8	that goal, the budget will provide the funding
9	necessary to retain additional workers hired this
10	year to help clean our buses, trains, and
11	facilities.
12	As always, the safety and security of our
13	customers and employees is our primary concern and
14	this proposed budget allocates significant funding
15	for those efforts. Of course, our greatest
16	resources are the hardworking men and women of the
17	CTA. And in 2025, we will continue to invest in
18	them. In the coming year, we will provide
19	additional training resources for our employees
20	along with expanded investment in employee
21	engagement and facilities.
22	We look forward to introducing the
23	proposed 2025 budget on Friday and look forward to
24	your thoughts and feedback.

1	Thank you, Mr. Chairman.
2	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Thank you,
3	Ms. Leerhsen.
4	I want to commend President Carter. Last
5	month, I attended the City Club address where he
6	laid out a strategy for CTA becoming a world-class
7	transit system where he challenged many of the
8	business and political elected officials as to how
9	we get this done to address some of the inequities
10	in funding our system here at CTA and in the
11	region as well and how it disproportionately
12	impacts certain customers in certain areas who
13	deserve and need public transportation.
14	I fully support this effort in bringing
15	attention to this issue and encourage my Board
16	colleagues to do the same. It's essential that we
17	continue to advocate for fair and equitable
18	funding that allows for us to meet the growing
19	demands of our service and deliver on our
20	commitments to the communities that we represent.
21	I'd like to also thank the strategic plan
22	team, Molly's team, for informing the Board,
23	briefing the Board members on the strategic plan
24	and seeking input from all of us on the Board as

1 And I'm encouraged by the thoughtfulness well. 2 and the effort that has gone into this process so 3 far and hoping that staff and Board members will 4 continue to collaborate on how to take the next 5 steps for moving CTA forward today and in the 6 future. 7 Regarding the upcoming budget proposal, 8 the Board received a preview of the proposed 9 budget in briefings and I appreciate the detailed 10 work that has gone into that process as well. 11 We must continue to show our stakeholders, 12 partners, and customers that we're making strategic decisions with their needs in mind and 13 exploring every avenue to enhance the experience 14 15 of our customers. 16 It is crucial that the budget reflect our 17 commitment to innovation. I am pleased to see 18 that we're using it not only to address our 19 immediate needs but also to explore new and 20 creative solutions to problems that we have as 2.1 well like security issues that has come up this 22 morning and that is of great concern to this 2.3 Board. 2.4 So, at this point, I'd like to open the

1	floor up to any other board members who might like
2	to respond to President Carter's report at this
3	time.
4	MS. GREENLEE: Okay. We'll take responses
5	from the Board members.
6	Director Jha.
7	DIRECTOR JHA: Thank you for the report.
8	MS. GREENLEE: Director Requejo.
9	DIRECTOR REQUEJO: I want to start by
10	thanking you, Nora, for the preview of the
11	strategic plan and the budget. I was very
12	surprised when I joined CTA to hear that we have
13	never done a strategic plan. As a planner, it was
14	pretty shocking that an agency of this size and
15	with this trajectory had never done something like
16	that.
17	And after the surprise, I thought, well,
18	let's take the opportunity to make this really
19	significant and set an example of what planning
20	should be.
21	I align with President Carter in making
22	in wanting to make CTA a world-class agency. And
23	I know that for us to be a world-class agency,
24	we're going to need a world-class strategic plan.

And so we should be looking at what other 1 2 agencies are doing in that front. We should not 3 be repeating and rehashing. And the most 4 important thing, it cannot be internally driven. 5 It has to be an open plan. 6 I was encouraged today -- although there 7 was a lot of conversation and conflict and 8 grievances -- but I was encouraged to see that 9 everyone who came in here with a grievance and an 10 issue and a problem came also an olive branch, 11 with an offer to help. People are eager to work 12 with CTA in solving these problems. 13 And so I've been pleasantly surprised 14 throughout my tenure here as to how responsive you 15 all are. One thing that I noticed is that you are 16 not great at asking for help. So I encourage you 17 all to ask for help because those folks are 18 banging the doors and have great ideas and 19 solutions, they have resources, and you don't have 20 to do this on your own. 2.1 And then as the chair mentioned, there's a 22 number of issues that have come up today that are 23 really important. From my perspective, 24 definitely, security and having a security plan

1 that is comprehensive, open, multilayered is 2 really important. 3 The other two things that I would love to 4 see through the budget process to demonstrate that 5 we are reallocating resources is, one, customer 6 experience and engagement. And I feel, many 7 times, we have a one-way street communication with 8 passengers where we don't kind of hear from them 9 or engage them in decision-making solutions. 10 And the other thing that came up today too is we have a great opportunity to set up resources 11 12 to better staff equitable transit-oriented 13 development. I think CTA should be proud of some examples that have taken place around town on 14 15 building near transit, affordable housing, 16 community centers, health clinics. 17 I don't think we're staffed yet and 18 resourced yet to the point that we can tackle a full agenda of how do we make our transit 19 20 equitable as it relates to development nearby. 2.1 So those three things I would encourage 22 you all to consider and make prominent in the budget, again, security, ETOD, and customer 23 2.4 experience and engagement.

1	MS. GREENLEE: Director Ortiz.
2	DIRECTOR ORTIZ: Yes. Thank you.
3	I mentioned earlier that I have been and
4	always have been excited about the strategic plan.
5	I've offered support. I've offered time. And I
6	also don't like surprises. And so, often, I am
7	surprised with, hey, this is everything that we've
8	been working on and here's the period on it
9	because we're done with it.
10	And I think there's a lot of support
11	available, there's a lot of different perspective,
12	there's a lot of great resources. And specific on
13	the strategic plan, I feel like there's a lot more
14	that can be done and being inclusive and being
15	thoughtful.
16	You know, I honestly, I feel like
17	there's been minimal briefings on that and not
18	just briefings but involvement of that work. I
19	feel often that we're just told, again, this is
20	what it is.
21	And so I really want to encourage,
22	specifically, to the strategic plan, that it be
23	fully vetted, thought out with different voices at
24	the table to be really, as we've talked about, a

1	world-class approach, plan, and overall
2	implementation plan to doing that work.
3	So I just wanted to note that and really
4	encourage a more thorough assessment, process, and
5	inclusivity specific to that because it's so
6	important.
7	The last not as high, but definitely
8	high is communications, not just with the riders,
9	but across our agency. We've talked about just
10	being able to connect directly with our staff and
11	not just putting stuff at State you know, at
12	the locations where they're at. And I've heard we
13	just post things and people that's how we know
14	or that's how people know.
15	I understand there's, under innovation, I
16	think, ways that we want to connect and I really
17	want to emphasize that we're looking at two-way
18	communications, again, across our customers but
19	also across our staff.
20	So I just want to highlight those two
21	pieces and hope that we can continue to work
22	through that together.
23	MS. LEERHSEN: Absolutely. And we
24	appreciate that feedback. I think a fundamental

1 component of the strategic plan is to have that 2 input and to make people feel that they are a part 3 of its formation. So we'll continue to keep that 4 aim and hear you on that feedback so far. 5 MS. GREENLEE: Director Jakes. 6 DIRECTOR JAKES: No question. 7 MS. GREENLEE: Director Lee. 8 DIRECTOR LEE: Just echoing the sentiment 9 of collaborative efforts and offer my support. 10 Thanks, Nora. 11 MS. GREENLEE: Director Eaddy. 12 DIRECTOR EADDY: Yes. I would concur with what I've heard already. And just want to frame 13 14 it this way, that, certainly, there needs to be 15 possibly some sort of a forum or a town hall or 16 something to be conceived to receive that kind of 17 community input. The optics of it is also very 18 good as well to even know that CTA is interested 19 to hear from the broader community. 20 And I think for me one of the persons that 2.1 came forward, Mr. Morton from Rogers Park, with 22 the fact that the CTA trains often are sources for those who are homeless, I do think that that needs 23 2.4 to be taken in as a part of the strategic plan of

1 what can CTA do to address that, to collaborate in 2 some way. 3 Because we know that the trains are often 4 that resource for that population. Well, let's 5 try to aid and address that problem. And so I 6 think that that was a legitimate concern for me as 7 I heard it and I would certainly suggest that that 8 be incorporated into a plan. 9 MS. LEERHSEN: Certainly. And with 10 regards to that comment -- and we can always provide you more information -- we do have 11 12 partnerships with social service agencies with the exact aim of housing as many people as possible 13 off of the CTA and providing them services. 14 15 that is in place. Always a fundamental thing to 16 look to grow and understand more of the 17 opportunity there. But that's been a 18 long-standing partnership with those agencies. 19 DIRECTOR EADDY: Which is just the fact 20 that I'm getting up to speed with some things. 2.1 But that just struck me in that way. But I'm glad 22 to know that something is already in place. 23 CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Thank you. Thank you, 24 Nora. I appreciate it. Hope Dorval feels better.

1	Our next item on the agenda is No. 6,
2	executive session. Kent Ray, our chief general
3	counsel, is there executive session today?

4	visitors, comprised of dignitaries, national
5	delegates, convention attendees, and tourists
6	traveled to Chicago to attend the DNC;
7	And, whereas, the DNC was a complete
8	success for the City of Chicago and highlighted
9	its many attributes;
10	And, whereas, the Chicago Transit
11	Authority played a key role in supporting the city
12	during the DNC providing transportation services
13	that contributed to the success of the event;
14	And, whereas, the employees of the Chicago
15	Transit Authority demonstrated exceptional
16	dedication, commitment, and professionalism in
17	providing dedicated bus shuttle transportation to
18	dignitaries and national delegates while still
19	delivering regular transit service to event
20	attendees, visitors, and everyday commuters during
21	the week of the event;
22	And, whereas, in addition to
23	transportation services, employees from
24	departments across the agency volunteered to serve

1 as information specialists, greeting and providing 2 assistance to visitors using CTA during the DNC; 3 And, whereas, the complex logistical 4 transportation demands during the DNC were 5 successfully met through the collective efforts of 6 CTA employees ensuring smooth operations and 7 minimizing disruptions to regular service; 8 And, whereas, the contributions of these 9 employees reflect positively on the CTA and its 10 longstanding expertise in delivering transit 11 service for special events enhancing the 12 reputation of the company and the city as an 13 outstanding host for major national events. Now, therefore be it resolved that the 14 15 Chicago Transit Board hereby acknowledges and 16 comments CTA employees from all departments for 17 their hard work, dedication, and the successful 18 execution of their responsibilities during the Democratic National Convention. 19 Be it further resolved that the Board 20 2.1 extends its deepest appreciation for the 22 employees' efforts in maintaining high quality service and contributing significantly to the 23 2.4 overall success of this historic event.

13	liability insurance for policy year November 1st,
14	2024 through October 31st, 2025.
15	Five, review of an ordinance authorizing
16	the purchase of cybersecurity insurance coverage
17	for policy year November 1st, 2024 through October
18	31st, 2025.
19	Review of an ordinance authorizing pilot
20	program agreements with Global Display Solutions,
21	Inc. and Papercast North America for digital bus
22	stop sign pilots under the CTA's Innovation Studio
23	program.
24	The Committee also reviewed eight

1	contracts. The Committee placed the six
2	ordinances and eight of the contracts on the
3	omnibus. The Committee approved and recommended
4	for Board approval six ordinances and eight
5	contracts.
6	This concludes the report of the Finance,
7	Audit, and Budget Committee.
