public comment. Georgette.
MS. GREENLEE: Mr. Chairman, we have we
had five registered public comments. I believe we
have three persons registered who are here. And I

1	will call them now.
2	I will, first of all, say thank you to our
3	public commentators for coming in today for our
4	meeting. And I will remind you that you have
5	three minutes to speak.
6	Trudy Leong from is it Rogers Park?
7	MS. LEONG: Rogers Park Chamber of
8	Commerce.
9	MS. GREENLEE: Rogers Park Chamber of
10	Commerce.
11	And you may start now.
12	MS. LEONG: Okay. Good morning, Board
13	members. Again, I am Trudy Leong, administrator
14	of the Rogers Park Chamber of Commerce. I work
15	with Bill Morton. He is the president of the
16	Rogers Park Chamber of Commerce.
17	And we also want to acknowledge one of our
18	constituents, Adam Mack. He is so happy that the
19	CTA service has returned to normal after the
20	pandemic.
21	As for the other business, we have been
22	there have been there has been a union steward
23	from Amalgamated Transit Union Local 308 that came
24	to us. And he can't appear before you because he

1	is working.
2	So there are a couple of issues about the
3	first of all, it's the second chance workers.
4	He is very concerned and they bring it to him that
5	they and some other CTA employees, they're not
6	being well-supported in the training by the CTA.
7	They have to work with dangerous chemicals and
8	they are getting injured.
9	Second is that there are not enough
10	employees to assign to the work. For instance, at
11	the Howard station and at the end of the line, one
12	employee has to clean eight cars and they're only
13	given two minutes to do it. And so that's why
14	trains are sometimes very dirty.
15	Bill and I ride the CTA all the time. We
16	love the CTA, but, however, it's very, very hard
17	to find a good seat, especially on the trains.
18	And then he is very concerned about
19	arbitrary write-ups that lead to firings because a
20	certain amount of write-ups and the employees are
21	fired and we asked him why and then he said that
22	it's harder to fire because of to save money on
23	pensions.
24	And, in addition, a lot of the CTA

1	workers, they half of their paycheck is going
2	into deductions, so they really don't have enough
3	money to live on and they have to get second jobs
4	or third jobs in order to support their families.
5	A lot of them are homeless and they are living on
6	the CTA and, also, their families are living on
7	the CTA, which leads us to three conditions that
8	we personally saw on the CTA. I have the dates
9	and the conditions and later
10	MS. GREENLEE: Ten seconds.

13	MS. LEONG: Okay. There was a hole in the
14	bus floor and then some CTA doors train doors
15	were not opening and that led to a lot of a lot
16	of confusion and I had to go to
17	MS. GREENLEE: Time.
18	MS. LEONG: Okay. Thank you. Any
19	questions? I will send you I could, if you
20	want, send you a transcript and a recording of our
21	talk with the union steward.
22	MS. GREENLEE: Ms. Leong, please feel free
23	to send that to the Board office. We will make
24	sure it is distributed.

1 MS. LEONG: Okay. 2 MS. GREENLEE: All right. 3 MS. LEONG: All right. Thank you so much. 4 No questions? Thank you. 5 MS. GREENLEE: I believe it's Niguy 6 McMullen. Good morning. 7 MR. MCMULLEN: Good morning, members of 8 the Board. My name is Niquy McMullen. I live 9 car-free in Evanston with my wife and my 10 eight-year-old daughter. We rely mainly on CTA 11 201 and the Purple Line for transportation. And I 12 am here today to speak on the topic of the 13 upcoming retirement of the current CTA president. First, I want to commend President Carter 14 15 for his years of service at CTA, especially in his 16 legacy of securing funding for the Red Line 17 Extension, which will be transformational for the far south side; however, under President Carter, 18 CTA has badly deteriorated and I believe it is 19 20 currently in a state of crisis. 21 I fell in love with Chicago when I first 22 visited a decade ago mainly because of the L. Ι 23 grew up in Florida where public transit is 24 basically nonexistent, so I was it amazing to

1	visit Chicago and be able to get around easily
2	without a car; however, the CTA of today is not
3	the CTA I fell in love with a decade ago. CTA
4	used to be well-renowned for its operational
5	excellence. Currently, it's very lacking in
6	speed, reliability, and cleanliness.
7	The Purple Line regularly only runs
8	between 60 to 70 percent of scheduled trips.
9	Canceled trips across the system are far too
10	common. I never once encountered people smoking
11	on public transit until I moved to Chicago. Now,
12	it's a regular occurrence on the Red Line.
13	I'm trying to teach my daughter the joys

4	excellent service is widely acclaimed.
5	We can turn the CTA around, but we need a
6	new leader that rides the system regularly, more
7	than a few times a year, a leader with significant
8	experience in transit operations and a passion to
9	transform CTA into the world-class system it once
10	was.
11	Chicago's fate is intertwined with the
12	fate of the CTA. Our great downtown, the economic
13	center of Chicago, would not exist without the L.
14	We need a new leader that rides the system
15	frequently enough to understand the customer
16	experience to make it right. Please ensure the
17	next president is someone capable, experienced,
18	and passionate about transit

21	the CTA as great as it should be.
22	Thank you so much.

24	MS. GREENLEE: I will read into the record

3	Good morning, Chicago Transit Board,	
4	Chairman Lester Barclay, Committee on Finance,	
5	Audit, and Budget, all CTA Board committee	
6	persons, President Dorval R. Carter, Jr., and	
7	operational staff.	
8	The Red Line Extension TIF Coalition is a	
9	regional public engagement platform working to	
10	monitor spending and planning programs aligned to	
11	the land development intergovernmental agreements,	
12	environmental protection uniform code compliance,	
13	and railroad operations along the Red Line	
14	Extension Project area.	
15	Today, we support all of the ordinance	
16	passed by the Finance, Audit, and Budget Committee	
17	that strengthens CTA's relationship with sister	
18	agencies while simultaneously bringing more riders	
19	to the system.	
20	Also, we wish to thank President Dorval	
21	Carter, Jr., for his dedication to public service	
22	and his sense of care to secure full funding	
23	agreements for the CTA Red Line Extension project.	
24	You are a good and faithful servant.	

1	Mr. Carter traveled the state of Illinois
2	and the halls of Congress tirelessly to secure
3	funding for the Chicago bus and rail system.
4	Mr. Carter demonstrated great care and attention
5	to CTA workers and unions to ensure all their
6	needs were met. President Carter worked to ensure
7	its riders were protected while riding the system
8	and was comfortable during the prolonged heat
9	waves and winter nights.
10	Through it all, President Carter was
11	steadfast and focused on making CTA number one in
12	the nation. We thank you. And, yes, we love you.
13	As you continue your great journey in life, may
14	God continue to send angels before you like Jacob.
15	Thank you, forevermore. Michael
16	LaFargue and I might have said that wrong
17	president of the Greater Far South Halsted Chamber
18	of Commerce, John Paul Jones, cofounder Red Line
19	Extension TIF Coalition, and Janet Bell, vice
20	president Golden Gate Community Organization and
21	board member of the Red Line Extension TIF
22	Coalition.
23	Our last public comment is Dr. Kisha
24	Roberts-Tabb.

1	DR. ROBERTS-TABB: Good morning. And
2	
	thank you to the board members for allowing me the
3	opportunity to address you with a statement
4	regarding domestic sex trafficking.
5	My name is Dr. Kisha Roberts and I am
6	currently a community psychologist, human
7	trafficking consultant, former human trafficking
8	specialist for Cook County Juvenile Probation and
9	Court Services and the founder of Girls Night Out
10	non-for-profit.
11	I would like to ground this conversation
12	first by giving basic knowledge around what is
13	human trafficking. Although human trafficking
14	encompasses both sex and labor, today, I will be
15	focusing on domestic sex trafficking and
16	exploitation.
17	Sex trafficking is defined as the
18	trafficking of which any commercial act is induced
19	by forced, fraud, or coercion, or in which the
20	person induced to perform such an act has not
21	obtained 18 years of age, along with the
22	recruitment harboring transportation provision in
23	obtaining a person for the purpose of a commercial
24	sex act. While commercial sex act does not have a

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1	monetary value, it is defined as the exchange of	
2	anything of value, shelter being a valuable source	
3	of trade.	
4	Acknowledging that there is a large	
5	population of homelessness within the City of	
6	Chicago, many taking shelter on the rails and	
7	properties of CTA, specifically adolescents,	
8	today, I am here to speak on the frequency of	
9	domestic sexual exploitation engagement on buses	
10	and railways to recruit, harbor, transport, and	
11	trade women and children for the purpose of a	
12	commercial sex trade.	
13	Throughout my 16 years of work with human	
14	trafficking advocacy and service provision, a	
15	common theme is the intersection of victims and	
16	public transportation.	
17	As the foundation of my advocacy work is	
18	grounded in street outreach, I have observed	
19	thousands of women and men use bus stops such as	
20	Washington and Kostner, Fullerton and Pulaski,	
21	Pulaski and Chicago Avenue, bus stops along Cicero	
22	from Roosevelt to 47th, from Cicero to Damen, 59th	
23	and both Halsted and Ashland, 62nd and Ashland,	
24	76th and Halsted, stops along 79th Street, 95th	

1	and the Dan Ryan, and Michigan Avenue from 103rd
2	to 119th just to name a few.
3	As I have assessed thousands of girls who
4	have indicated that they have worked trains and
5	transit stations to meet what they refer to as
6	their Johns and 16s, which is a term used for
7	customers and buyers, offering statements like I
8	just sat next to him and asked if he wanted to
9	party and he knew what time it was.
10	Girls have told me that their pimps make
11	them use the bus stops because the police will not
12	bother them there. I encourage Chicago Transit
13	Authority to invest in human trafficking
14	identification training with collaborating with
15	community-based providers to intersect trafficking
16	on bus stops and trains while offering valuable
17	services to marginalized populations.
18	Thank you for your time.
19	Are there any questions?
20	DIRECTOR JAKES: I do. But I'm going to
21	have somebody get in contact with you.
22	DR. ROBERTS-TABB: Thank you.
23	MS. GREENLEE: Thank you.
24	Chairman Barclay, there are no further

1	public comments.	
2	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Our next order of	
3	business is a construction report from Bill	
4	Mooney, our chief infrastructure officer, and	
5	JuanPablo Prieto, our director of diversity	
6	programs.	
7	MR. MOONEY: Good morning. I'm Bill	
8	Mooney, your chief infrastructure officer. And	
9	I'm joined today by	
10	MR. PRIETO: JuanPablo Prieto, director of	
11	diversity programs.	
12	MR. MOONEY: We have an abridged version	
13	of your monthly construction update.	
14	We'll start where we normally do with our	
15	a Canal, Barry, Damen substation upgrade project.	
16	Most of the focus at both Damen and Canal has been	
17	on the commissioning phases of the equipment	
18	that's been installed. I've showed you pictures	
19	over the last couple of months.	
20	Here's a photo of the work going on at	
21	Damen as it prepares to commission this equipment	
22	and bring it online in the upcoming months.	
23	At Barry, now that we are weather tight	
24	there, they have started doing most of the	

1	interior work, prepping for the equipment, which
2	will be coming in the next two months. And you'll
3	start to see photos of that coming installed on
4	site and it will move into its commissioning phase
5	this spring.
6	At our Brown Line station improvement
7	project, as we finish up with most of the seasonal
8	work here, here, you can see the finished work
9	around the roof edges and some of the final, you
10	know, restoration of the steel that we've been
11	working on throughout the summer. As we move kind
12	of into the later winter months, then we'll start
13	seeing some of the that station work coming out,
14	things like paint being done.
15	MS. GREENLEE: Bill, please speak up and
16	slow down.
17	MR. MOONEY: On our Harlem bus bridge
18	project, we have been focusing on closing up the
19	steelwork for the season. Here are a couple
20	photos of the ironworkers doing the detailed work
21	on those large steel members we shared the last
22	couple of months.
23	In March, they are anticipating the big
24	pour of concrete for this bridge path. It is a

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1	bit weather dependent. It becomes a little bit	
2	more challenging with its exposure in the deep	
3	cold temperatures right now.	
4	Here's another photo of that finished prep	
5	work. Once this work is kind of ready for that	
6	pour in March, it will move forward into its	
7	finished work and some of the other restoration	
8	that goes around this bridge installation.	
9	At our Racine and Morgan improvement	
10	project, we've got a station, so I've shown a lot	
11	of great improvements over the last couple months	
12	here. Here's a south facing view.	
13	The station at Racine is being prepped for	
14	the precast panel exterior, so this gets a white	
15	precast panel with a big CTA logo on it as part of	
16	its architectural features. You can also see that	
17	waterfall staircase that we've talked about over	
18	the last couple months.	
19	On the inside, we are starting to see the	
20	finishes in the station itself. As now it's water	
21	tight, it's being warmed for the winter months.	
22	Here are the windows being installed in the	
23	station. Those are the windows that will be	
24	receiving that art glass the mural around it	

1	that we saw last month. And, here, you can see	
2	some of the tile work going in on the interior	
3	finishes.	
4	At Morgan, it's being prepped to be fully	
5	watertight at this point. You can see some of the	
6	access panels on the second story being closed up.	
7	And here you can see that framework from the	
8	inside and a lot of the detail work and wiring is	
9	starting to get ready for equipment installation	
10	in the summer months.	
11	We came to the conclusion of our 2024	
12	refresh and renew program in December with 29 of	
13	the 29 committed stations completed as well as all	
14	14 of the bus terminals.	
15	The last station in our list was Grand on	
16	the Red Line. Here, you can see some before and	
17	afters of our lighting improvements. This is the	
18	upgrade to the LEDs within the station footprint,	
19	a couple different views of that.	
20	And then here at Grand and Latrobe, our	
21	last bus turnaround for the season, you can see	
22	the bus turnaround bathroom. This is our	
23	employee-facing facility there to support our	
24	employees that got a facelift as well.	

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1	This will go onto the internal program.	
2	So over the next couple months, we'll spend most	
3	of our time focusing on our major rail maintenance	
4	facilities and bus maintenance facilities. And	
5	then we will be back in the spring with the	
6	customer-facing program again.	
7	The Red/Purple modernization project. We	
8	proceed forward with kind of the last phases	
9	around the Red/Purple bypass. So over the next	
10	month or so, we will be untangling the multi	
11	reroutes that we've created in that corridor and	
12	starting to commission the last sections of the	
13	new track.	
14	Here, you can see some of that finished	
15	work going on in the corridor. So, here, they're	
16	installing sound panels around the transition from	
17	the concrete deck that we've recently been pouring	
18	and showing you a lot of work up through the steel	
19	structure as this looks kind of north towards	
20	Addison.	
21	And here is some finish work around the	
22	Clark Street substation. We showed some of this	
23	form work over the last couple months. Here is	
24	kind of that finished barrier wall for the	

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1	courtyard.

2	And up on the farther north portion of the
3	project, we are continuing to see the stations
4	advancing. So, here, you see at Bryn Mawr the
5	grand staircase getting its granite finish. Also
6	at Bryn Mawr was the restoration of the
7	streetscape. This is the bus parking pad right
8	outside the station.

9 Moving further down to Berwyn, it's getting interior finishes now. And this is the 10 11 installation of the granite flooring as they do 12 the grouting around those granite pavers. It's 13 also starting to see some of the exterior prep work for the roofing. It has kind of a grand kind 14 15 of canopy that hangs out over the front of the 16 station, that work here.

And all the stations now are seeing the precast panel installation. So here's an example at Argyle. We've seen a lot of this work going on at Bryn Mawr and Berwyn. Here it is at Argyle as they're putting the platform in place.

And at Lawrence, it's starting to see its enclosures. This is the final concrete pour of the project here with the staircase. And we're

1	happy to see that go forward.
2	We continue our continuous outreach with
3	the community. We participated in the Chicago
4	Department of Planning meeting in the 44th Ward to
5	talk about the TOD sites not only available
6	through the end of our project here, but, also,
7	some of the other sites in the area that are part
8	of our major planning plan there.
9	We had a very advanced TOD plan associated
10	with the project. And this was really just
11	touching base with the community as we're getting
12	ready to start going out to release those RFPs in
13	accordance with the plan, making sure we're still
14	in line with what the expectations of the
15	community are. So we were glad to be a party to
16	that.
17	And the last note for me on this would be
18	I would be remiss to not add the project that
19	we're regularly reporting on to note that this
20	past Friday, we did have the historic action taken
21	with the signing of a Red Line Extension project.
22	So here you can see the official signing
23	of the contract for the Federal Government's
24	almost \$2 billion commitment to that project. And

1	here's a picture of the ceremonial signing. I
2	know many of the Board members were there to
3	participate and be a party to that as well. It
4	was a great, exciting event.
5	And, finally, just a bit of the team.
6	This process has been going on since 2006 when the
7	Board took that action. We've talked about that.
8	It has really been an aggressively part of it over
9	the last three years. There have been hundreds of
10	people who have worked on the numerous aspects to
11	secure this funding. This is just a small token
12	group who was there participating with us.
13	So, with that, I'll pause and turn it over
14	to JuanPablo.
15	MR. PRIETO: Thanks, Bill.
16	As of the end of November of RPM, 121
17	unique DBEs have been awarded almost \$292 million
18	between the design and construction packages. 54
19	of those are new to CTA. DBEs have been paid more
20	than \$189 million, which puts the prime
21	contractors' attainment at 17.5 percent.
22	On the workforce side, as of the end of
23	November, 2,557 unique workers have logged over
24	2.1 million labor hours and earned over \$127

1	million. The prime contractor is tracking to meet
2	their workforce goals.
3	In December, we attended a number of
4	events to inform small businesses and residents
5	about contracting and career opportunities on CTA
6	projects. We also hosted our quarter four DBE and
7	workforce force event. Our workforce event was
8	held on December 4th at Truman College where 52
9	attendees heard a presentation on upcoming
10	projects and networked with workforce partners,
11	trade unions, and contractors to talk about career
12	opportunities.
13	Our DBE event was held on December 11th at
14	Daley College where 60 attendees heard about
15	upcoming contracts and networked with prime and
16	potential prime contractors to discuss how they
17	can partner on CTA projects.
18	We attended membership meetings for the
19	Chatham Business Association and the National
20	Association of Minority Contractors to continue
21	our Red Line Extension road show where we and
22	Walsh Vinci discussed how DBEs can compete for the
23	work on that project.
24	We also held a follow-up session with

1	HACIA's professional services committee to discuss
2	design opportunities on the Red Line Extension.
3	We also hosted just to preview January
4	a little bit on January 10th, the same day as
5	the signing, a certification drive at Altgeld
6	Gardens where we had 27 individuals show up to get
7	their businesses their applications started for
8	DBEs. So we had them do a little bit of prework,
9	registering as a vendor, bringing all their
10	documents on the jump drive so that we can guide
11	them through the application process. So we look
12	forward to welcoming some new DBEs into the pool.
13	That concludes our report. Happy to
14	answer any questions.
15	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: I don't have any
16	questions.
17	MS. GREENLEE: Does any other member of
18	the Board have a question?
19	Director Jha.
20	DIRECTOR JHA: Yeah. It's more of a
21	request than a question. Could we start adding
22	ADA accessible stations list into this report
23	moving forward where we can see how many are, how
24	many aren't, and if there's any plan of moving

1	towards that?
2	MR. MOONEY: Sure. I mean, we could
3	include a slide that shows the current number of
4	accessible stations to ones currently in planning
5	and design that have funding associated with them
6	as well as ones that are under construction and
7	then what that total will be and you can see that
8	change going over.
9	Racine is one of the current ones in our
10	construction. Austin is just starting to get
11	going. You'll start seeing some reporting on
12	those. But we do have a bunch of others that are
13	in the design and the kind of phasing process that
14	have secured funding.
15	DIRECTOR JHA: Yeah. It would just be
16	good to know total versus where were we are and
17	maybe have some goals around year over year.
18	Same request around EVs, if there's any
19	electronic buses, if there's any progress.
20	Because I know we have a goal of 2040, I think.
21	We haven't really talk about and if we're if
22	that's achievable or not. I think it would be
23	good to get a summary of where we're at.
24	PRESIDENT CARTER: We can certainly talk

1	to you about that. That's not Bill's area of
2	responsibility.
3	DIRECTOR JHA: Okay. Well, whoever it is.
4	PRESIDENT CARTER: We can create a report
5	around that issue.
6	And as Bill indicated, with regards to the
7	ADA work, there are multiple components to it.
8	Some of it is how to make the station accessible.
9	There's also upgrades that we're doing, escalators
10	and elevators and other things, that are part of
11	the ongoing effort to improvable accessibility on
12	our system and we can give you a report that
13	reflects all of those activities.
14	DIRECTOR JHA: I'm just saying on a month
15	to month
16	MR. MOONEY: I would say that, generally
17	speaking, month to month, there won't be a lot of
18	changes. Because a project going under
19	construction, it's under construction for 18
20	moths, it won't be accessible for that 18 months,
21	right? And there's not that many projects coming
22	in. So we can send you a report and that report
23	will likely be stagnant for many, many months
24	until something maybe comes out of design and

1	moves toward a bid phase that moves into
2	construction.
3	DIRECTOR JHA: Which is fine. Just having
4	even if it's an appendix in the construction
5	report that says this is the plan for this year
6	and whenever there is change, you report it. If
7	not
8	MR. MOONEY: We had a couple graphics in
9	the All Stations Accessibility Plan briefing we
10	did with you. We can revisit those that are
11	pretty common graphics that show the phasing of
12	this that I think would be useful.
13	DIRECTOR JHA: Thank you. I appreciate
14	that.
15	MS. GREENLEE: Any other questions from
16	any of the Board members or comments?
17	DIRECTOR REQUEJO: No questions. Just
18	congrats on the progress.
19	And just one reminder or request
20	repeated request to think about presenting to our
21	Board at some point in the next year the TOD
22	strategy as a whole. I love hearing these pieces
23	here and there, but I think we have now an
24	opportunity to present all of this as a cohesive

1	strategy with the City, with the different
2	departments there, and others.
3	And some of us are worried about the Red
4	Line in that we love to see the construction and
5	the plans and everything, but we also worry that
6	some of those areas where the improvements on the
7	north side are going to gentrify and some of
8	people who can live now and can afford cannot. So
9	find those TOD sites and making them equitable,
10	very important.
11	And at the end of the line, the community
12	is eager not just to see the Red Line Extension,
13	but to see the full development of those stations
14	of the in fill, of the new facilities,
15	restaurants, housing centers.
16	And so I think we are overdue to get a
17	sense of what the overall plan is and I would love
18	if we could have a report to the Board in the
19	upcoming year.
20	MR. MOONEY: In anticipation of your
21	ongoing request for this, we have been meeting
22	proactively with law and planning and
23	infrastructure and real estate and all those
24	players that play with this to kind of coalesce

1	that into one conversation. Not only yourself but
2	many of the Board members are very interested in
3	that development. Chairman Barclay said it's near
4	and dear to your heart about getting density
5	around our stations. I'm sure we can work on
6	something.
7	PRESIDENT CARTER: Yeah. And, Bill, it
8	may be worth reaching out to the City's planning
9	department and talk about maybe having someone
10	come over as well to talk about some of the
11	broader plans, particularly around Red Line
12	Extension, which is, obviously, not just a CTA
13	conversation, it's a City of Chicago conversation,
14	but I think it's one which we can get the Board
15	briefed on what the plans are and how they're
16	planning to move forward with that.
17	I know the Chairman tends to hear some of
18	that in his role on the planning commission, but I
19	know the Board as a whole doesn't necessarily get
20	the same insight in terms of what bigger
21	opportunities are and how they're approaching
22	that. So, yeah, we'll make sure you get that.
23	DIRECTOR REQUEJO: Thank you.
24	DIRECTOR ORTIZ: I echo the comments that

1	have been made. So just second everything that's
2	been shared.
3	I just wanted to note the event last
4	Friday was an incredible opportunity to come
5	together and celebrate all of the work that has
6	been sort of in the process, as mentioned, for
7	decades, 60 years. So it was just really an
8	important event to be a part of.
9	Congratulations to all of the team members
10	who have been so diligently working on this, the
11	leadership as well in terms of getting that
12	funding. That absolutely has been no small task.
13	So even to getting that to full funding is an
14	incredible milestone that deserves a full
15	celebration as it did last week.
16	So, congratulations, again, to everyone
17	for all of the efforts to make that happen.
18	MS. GREENLEE: Director Eaddy.
19	DIRECTOR EADDY: Yeah. I'm always
20	intrigued about any type of construction projects.
21	And I had raised it before about having an
22	opportunity to have access or be taken on any of
23	the construction projects that are ongoing. So,

1	arranged.
2	PRESIDENT CARTER: We will work with April
3	and Bill and set up a tour for you of both our
4	existing major construction projects as well as
5	give you a tour of the Red Line Extension corridor
6	and the work we're going to be doing there. We'll
7	coordinate with the Chairman's office to find a
8	time to do that.
9	DIRECTOR EADDY: All right. I welcome
10	that. Thank you.
11	MR. MOONEY: Yeah. I'm more than glad to
12	do it. Nothing funner in my job than to get out
13	there. So let's go.
14	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: The next item on the

4	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: I will now entertain a
5	motion to appoint Nora Leerhsen as acting
6	president of Chicago Transit Authority and to set
7	an annual salary of the acting president as
8	\$278,703.73 for the time serving in such position.
9	DIRECTOR REQUEJO: So moved.
10	DIRECTOR LEE: Second.
11	MS. GREENLEE: It's been moved by Director
12	Requejo, seconded by Director Lee to appoint Nora
13	Leerhsen as the acting president of the Chicago
14	Transit Authority and to set the annual salary of
15	the acting president at \$278,703.73 for the time
16	serving in such position.
17	We'll take a roll call vote.
18	Director Jha.
19	DIRECTOR JHA: Yes.
20	MS. GREENLEE: Director Requejo.
21	DIRECTOR REQUEJO: Yes.

1	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Yes.

5	DIRECTOR LEE: Yes.
6	MS. GREENLEE: Director Eaddy.
7	DIRECTOR EADDY: Yes.
8	MS. GREENLEE: The motion passes.
9	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Our next item of
10	business on the agenda is our President's report,
11	which will be given by our president, Dorval
12	Carter.
13	PRESIDENT CARTER: Thank you for this very
14	short and quick Board meeting today.
15	Mr. Chairman, members of the Board, good
16	afternoon.
17	I was 27 years old when I first walked
18	into the Merchandise Mart and began my career as a
19	staff attorney at the CTA. It was an exciting
20	time for me. But like most young people, I
21	honestly had no idea what the future was going to
22	hold.
23	Even as I found myself quickly enamored
24	with public service, even as I felt the deepening

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1	pride of being a part of an agency that is so
2	important to Chicago residents and visitors, I
3	never imagined that I would end up becoming
4	president of the Chicago Transit Authority.
5	As the years have gone by, an unexpected
6	career path unfolded before me. I felt a strong
7	pull towards public transportation and,
8	ultimately, I made the decision that this industry
9	would not simply be a professional stop along the
10	way, but it would be where I would spend the
11	majority of my life's work.
12	During that time, I've had the privilege
13	of serving at high level roles at both the local
14	and federal levels. It has been a rewarding and
15	fulfilling experience that has exceeded my wildest
16	dreams.
17	Today, more than 40 years later, looking
18	back at my years in public transportation, what
19	has fascinated me about the richness of my
20	experience has been the people that I've met, the
21	work I've had the opportunity to do, and the
22	challenges that I have worked to overcome while
23	standing shoulder to shoulder with all of my
24	colleagues.

1	The sum of my experience working at this
	The sum of my experience working at this
2	agency has been a portfolio of knowledge about
3	public transit and the resulting respect for the
4	hark work that it takes to lead a transit system.
5	This job can be very difficult, but the
6	challenges that I faced have been eclipsed by the
7	opportunity to work with a group of professionals
8	who are among the best in our industry. And I am
9	eternally grateful to the employees and the
10	management team that have supported me every day
11	that we have done this work.
12	Of course, so many of the most important,
13	most vital employees at CTA aren't here today.
14	They drive the buses, they operate the trains,
15	they serve our customers without regard to weather
16	or street conditions. They work in rail stations
17	and help our customers find their way across the
18	city. They clean, repair, and maintain our
19	vehicles and rail stations, and many others spend
20	long hours managing the people who are doing that
21	work or supporting their efforts in a number of
22	different ways.
23	I've spent a combined quarter century
24	bearing witness to the hard work being done by the

1	men and women of CTA's workforce and it is truly a
2	humbling experience. I have often noted my
3	respect and appreciation for the CTA family of
4	employees. And, today, standing at the end of
5	this 40-year journey, that admiration has only
6	grown.
7	Throughout the years, I've had the
8	opportunity to visit other public transit systems
9	in other cities domestically and internationally,
10	all with an eye towards bringing back useful
11	information, observations regarding best practices
12	or new technologies that could benefit our
13	organization.
14	Those experiences have included, for
15	instance, new ideas on how we provide bus service
16	and ways to improve our new control center, among
17	other insights that have, I believe, helped me and
18	my staff make CTA better, more effective, and more
19	supportive of the communities that we serve and
20	have provided insights to help us improve CTA in
21	the future.
22	I would be remiss if I didn't touch on a
23	final note before leaving CTA and it's something
24	that I have talked about for many years, well

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1	before the COVID-19 pandemic hit.
2	For years, it has been a central focus of
3	mine, and I believe it is the most important
4	challenge facing public transit in Chicago. Above
5	all else, the future of CTA is about how this
6	region's public transit systems are funded.
7	Funding is a critical component to support
8	legacy public transit systems like ours and, to be
9	frank, no matter how good one's intentions, no
10	matter how much one truly believes in equitable
11	transit outcomes, providing the services that are
12	most transit dependent low income customers need
13	cost money.
14	The change of CTA's funding formula is a
15	can that has been kicked down the road for decades
16	and its shortcomings have exacerbated and were
17	exacerbated by the COVID-19 pandemic. The
18	unfortunate result is now a political climate
19	where those who are able to effect that change
20	that needs to be made are, again, definitely
21	looking for scapegoats and excuses on which to
22	blame four decades inaction.
23	That time is over. It won't be easy, but
24	it has to get done. If we ever hope to achieve a

1	world-class transit system in Chicago, I can
2	provide you with an example of doing the type of
3	hard work that will be required to move forward.
4	Last Friday, CTA was joined by local and
5	federal officials to celebrate a signed
6	full-funding grant agreement from the Federal
7	Transit Administration for the Red Line Extension.
8	And I doubt anyone in this room was happier about
9	that than I was.
10	What can get lost in that celebration is
11	the hard work and long history required to
12	actually get to that day. The focus on actually
13	making the Red Line Extension a reality began in
14	earnest in 2016, not long after I began as
15	president.
16	I worked closer with then Mayor Rahm
17	Emanuel to create the transit tax increment
18	financing district, which became known as the
19	transit TIF, which was a tool for local funding
20	for both the Red/Purple modernization project on
21	Chicago's north side, the Red Line Extension
22	project on the south side, and which has potential
23	to be used to fund upgrades on the Forest Park
24	branch of the Blue Line on the City's west side.

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1	After the General Assembly approved the
2	transit TIF in 2016, we worked to gain the Chicago
3	City Council's approval for the TIF, which was
4	successful. Thanks to their support in 2022, the
5	transit TIF is expected to generate \$959 million.
6	Only then were we able to move forward with FTA's
7	nearly @2 billion commitment.
8	That, of course, is only the financial
9	side of this discussion. The extensive work
10	related to engineering, project development,
11	contract evaluation, and other vital areas
12	culminated in last week's celebration at the House
13	of Hope what an appropriate name recognizing
14	our efforts to fulfill a promise that we made
15	nearly 60 years ago.
16	I'm sharing that timeline with you to
17	provide some perspective on the hard work that was
18	required to get us here today and the often slow
19	pace of progress required to achieve the results
20	that we want. It took focus, it took time, and,
21	most important, it required funding, funding that
22	we worked hard to get because we believed the
23	people of the far south side deserve the same
24	access to transit, jobs, and opportunities as the

1	
1	rest of the city.
2	The ability to see the long view, to plan,
3	strategize, execute over many years has been
4	central to the successes that I've enjoyed
5	throughout my career. That is especially true in
6	the case of the Red Line Extension and
7	extraordinary results that we achieved, which make
8	me very proud.
9	I committed nearly ten years of my life to
10	the CTA presidency, working to achieve goals that
11	I've shared with 10,000-plus CTA employees, along
12	with my senior leadership team. We've worked to
13	drive our Agency's priorities leading to a
14	confidence that I know have made the city better.
15	We have created and contributed to a legacy that
16	will last for many generations to come.
17	As many of you likely know, while I'm
18	retiring from public transit, I am not at the end
19	of my professional journey. Instead, I will soon
20	be taking a new path as the president and chief
21	executive officer of Saint Anthony's Hospital on
22	the west side of the city.
23	I have a long relationship with Saint
24	Anthony's, including a tenure as Board chair, and

1	will follow in the footsteps of my father who was
2	a doctor at the hospital for 40 years and served
3	for ten years as chair of the obstetrics and
4	gynecology department.
5	Today, Saint Anthony's maternity ward
6	named the Dr. Dorval and Vivian Carter Family
7	Birthing Center is named in my parents' honor and
8	I carry them in my spirit into this next
9	challenge.
10	I cannot be more excited to start the next
11	chapter of my life, but I want you all to know
12	that it has been an honor of a lifetime to serve
13	as CTA president and it is humbling to remember
14	that this journey began when I was a little boy on
15	the south side of Chicago discovering our amazing
16	city while riding buses and trains provided by
17	this agency that I would one day lead, lead
18	alongside the people that I would one day serve.
19	I am forever grateful for this opportunity
20	to serve our customers, the people of the City of
21	Chicago, and this esteemed Board.
22	Thank you, Chairman Barclay. That
23	concludes my remarks.
24	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Thank you, President

1	Carter.
2	President Carter, as Chairman of the
3	Board, I want to express my gratitude to you for
4	your years of dedicated service and leadership to
5	the CTA. Over the past ten years as president,
6	you have guided this agency through moments of
7	tremendous success and achievement as well as
8	periods of significant challenge.
9	Through it all, your steadfast commitment
10	to this agency, to the public we serve, and to
11	this great city has remained clear and unwavering.
12	You have been a champion for equity,
13	ensuring that our service and initiatives reflect
14	the communities we serve. This is exemplified in
15	CTA's successful DBE program and historic industry
16	initiatives like the equity and infrastructure
17	project, which you co-chaired, and, most notably,
18	the Red Line Extension project.
19	Without your leadership, vision, and
20	expertise, this project would still be a deferred
21	promise and not the exciting reality it is with
22	the signing of the Federal full-funding agreement
23	last week.
24	You led this agency through a

1	once-in-a-lifetime pandemic, a time of tremendous
2	loss and uncertainty for everyone and every
3	industry. And when most transit systems ramped
4	down or shut down, you kept our system going for
5	those who relied on it to provide and receive
6	essential services.
7	There's been a great deal of Monday
8	morning quarterbacking on decisions. But to the
9	folks who relied on our system to get them where
10	they needed to go in those critical times, it was
11	imperative.
12	The transit industry even recognized and
13	applauded you and the CTA by awarding the American
14	Public Transit Association outstanding transit
15	manager and outstanding transit agency in 2021,
16	the first time in the Association's history that a
17	single transit agency was recognized with both
18	awards and in the same year. That's a result of
19	your leadership, sir.
20	Personally, I remember when you were
21	presented with the job of heading up New York
22	transit and you brought that to me, that you had
23	been offered that job. And then Boston transit as
24	well. You turned those down to stay here in

1	Chicago to make sure that the Red Line Extension
2	project got to where it needed to go.
3	You're a true transportation professional
4	with a remarkable career spanning decades in the
5	transit industry. My first encounter with you was
6	about 39 years ago as young lawyers working on a
7	transportation project. Earning respect not only
8	within our organization but across the nation and
9	the world, your leadership and legacy will leave a
10	positive and lasting impact on the CTA.
11	On behalf of the Board, I want to express
12	my deepest gratitude for your years of service,
13	your leadership, and commitment to advancing the
14	CTA's mission.
15	While your presence will be deeply missed,
16	your impact will continue to guide us as we build
17	upon the foundation which you've laid.
18	I want to wish you nothing but the best as
19	you step into this next chapter of your life. May
20	it be filled with happiness, health, and continued
21	success in all your future endeavors.
22	Thank you for everything you've done for
23	CTA, the City of Chicago, and the transit
24	industry. You leave a legacy that will never be

1	forgotten.	
2	Thank you very much.	
3	I'd like to open it up to other Board	
4	members at this time.	
5	DIRECTOR JHA: I'm going to start.	
6	I don't think there's any words to express	
7	the gratitude and how lucky I feel to be on this	
8	Board, seeing you, how you lead your team, the	
9	humanity. Countless number of times we've had	
10	wonderful conversation and I look forward to	
11	those. We hope that you continue, as you said, to	
12	help when we need.	
13	It's been incredible to see what public	
14	service is like and how to uphold those standards	
15	and raise the bar higher and higher with every	
16	single monthly Board meeting that we come to. So	
17	we're going to miss you. But we also know that	
18	you're not going far. But we're going to miss	
19	you. We're going to miss you a lot.	
20	Thank you so much.	
21	DIRECTOR REQUEJO: And I don't want to	
22	repeat the things that the Chair has mentioned.	
23	Your professional trajectory is clear, your track	
24	record.	

1	I'd rather focus on the personal. And
2	when you communicated to me your next move, I
3	expressed that I wanted to thank you on a personal
4	level as a human being knowing the amount of human
5	energy and humanity that you have invested in this
6	organization.
7	There are three values that you carried
8	forward in my nine months here that I wanted to
9	make sure are appreciated and acknowledge.
10	Number one, Dorval, is your
11	responsiveness. Every single time I reach out, I
12	ask a question in person, by e-mail, by text, you
13	directly responded and you connected me with
14	people in your team to respond to those questions,
15	no exceptions made.
16	Second, your respect. Your respect that
17	you have shown when sometimes we challenged, you
18	know, each other and we have came up to this table
19	and behind scenes with ideas that we were not in
20	agreement and the utmost respect was always
21	offered from your end. And your ability to listen
22	and to incorporate feedback is outstanding.
23	And the third thing is your resilience,
24	your resilience through perhaps the hardest moment

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1	for public transportation and for CTA in the
2	history of this country, right? And that pandemic
3	and the human toll it took, you absorbed all of
4	that and you decided to stay, as the Chair
5	mentioned. And that is something that will be
6	appreciated for a very, very long time and honors
7	you.
8	So I want to congratulate you for your
9	next move. I also want to congratulate your new
10	home because they are getting a huge gift with you
11	at Saint Anthony's Hospital, a transit-oriented
12	hospital at California station.
13	And, finally, I really hope from a
14	personal level that you get to turn your phone off
15	the whole night on December 31st and moving
16	forward as much as possible because you truly have
17	earned that, Dorval.
18	Thank you.
19	DIRECTOR ORTIZ: Yeah. I want to second
20	everyone's comments. There wasn't much more to
21	say.
22	But I coming into the Board and knowing
23	the responsibility of this position and taking
24	that on, right, it's a personal commitment.

1	I just want to thank you for all of what
2	you've gifted the city and our suburbs because
3	it's our region that's impacted by the CTA, your
4	unwavering commitment to do the best thing. And
5	I've always felt again, coming into this role,
6	I always felt like your heart was in the right
7	place. You have always meant the good and the
8	best for our people in the city and in our region.
9	So regardless of the various details or
10	things or how to get to things or what solution we
11	come up with, that always gave me peace, knowing
12	that your heart was in the right place.
13	And so I thank you for that. I thank you
14	for always thinking about our city and our region
15	and doing your very best to do right for everyone
16	here. So thank you for that. And congratulations
17	again.
18	I second Roberto's comment. Saint Anthony
19	is getting a gift. I know your personal
20	connections to the hospital and to the area. I
21	share them in so many different ways. So I'm
22	excited for the transformation they're going to
23	have and all the great things that are going to
24	come with the hospital, Saint Anthony, and with

1	yourself.
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2	DIRECTOR JAKES: Dorval, I want to deal
3	with it from a different perspective. Because
4	you, for me, and for a lot of young black boys and
5	girls, you are the best of who we are. And we
6	needed to see you. And I am grateful that you
7	have modeled a life for our community that
8	encourages us, that gives us someone that we can
9	look at and hold up to say here's somebody that
10	you can emulate.
11	When and I don't know if you remember
12	this. But when we had the I don't know if they
13	were in Chicago, wherever they were, the young
14	people, and they were downstairs and this one
15	young black man young black boy, he asked
16	you he said, what do you do? And you looked at
17	him and you said, I'm doing what you should be
18	doing and can do in the next 15, 20 years. And
19	that meant the world to him and to me.
20	So thank you for being that person that we
21	can hold up as a model of excellence and
22	greatness.
23	The other part is there is a poem that is
24	near and dear to us called the Test of a Man. And

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1	you have exemplified the test of a man. Now, for
2	those that do not know the poem, they can Google
3	it. I will not say it. But you have, indeed,
4	exemplified the test of a man because in the seven
5	years I've had the pleasure of working with you,
6	you have taken life's numerous bumps and blows and
7	still continue to have what I call the weeble
8	wobble spirit. You weebled and you wobbled, but
9	they didn't knock you down.
10	And so thank you so much for all that
11	you've done. I wish you well for all that you are
12	yet to do down the street. And it's still not too
13	late to rescind your resignation, if you want to.
14	Thank you, Dorval.
15	DIRECTOR LEE: Hard to follow all the
16	comments. But just from a personal perspective of
17	a rider, thank you for doing this for the city and
18	making sure the people like me can get where they
19	need to go. And it's part of why I love Chicago.
20	And thank you for being part of this. And your
21	legacy will never be forgotten. And we're going
22	to miss you so much.
23	DIRECTOR EADDY: Well, as the newest
24	member of the Board, I tell you, part of my

1	excitement in coming on to this very distinguished
2	Board and group was I was going to get a chance to
3	work with Dorval Carter.
4	I certainly like many others, we've
5	observed you, we've followed you, never had the
6	opportunity before just a few months ago to
7	actually work with you, be up close. And I was
8	really very excited about this opportunity.
9	And so it's certainly bittersweet in many
10	regards because you represent so much and so much
11	that is good and you're one that an individual can
12	glean so much from.
13	When I think about you, it comes to my
14	mind you're the consummate professional. You're
15	always professional. You're always on point. And
16	I admire that about you. And it is for me to just
17	say, in my opinion, you never appear lost. You
18	have a sense of direction. You know exactly where
19	you're going and you know exactly how to get
20	there.
21	And I join with Reverend Jakes to say
22	and I thought about it and you are the epitome
23	and you express ethnic pride. You represent the
24	best and brightest of who you are, who you're

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1	connected to. And just want you to know that
2	individuals like myself, we're cheering you on all
3	the time because of what you represent and it's
4	all good.
5	And I was so happy for you because I've
6	known of your efforts around the Red Line
7	Extension. And that is a crowning achievement.
8	And I'll say this. You really knew how to go out
9	on top, you know? You know how to go out on top.
10	And I just want you to know and I'll close with
11	this.
12	You're a very humble man and your
13	greatness is in your humility. And I want you to
14	know that we commend you for that. And I just
15	think that you're the greatest and your transition
16	to the hospital is just an indicator of your
17	continued service to humanity. And you are
18	commendable. And I want you to know that, sir.
19	Hats off to you.
20	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Thank you.
21	We will bring back President Carter at a
22	future date to recognize him as well.
23	Our final order of business, Georgette, to
24	what? The latest I've ever been here.

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1	It's new business. Is there any new
2	business, Georgette?
3	MS. GREENLEE: Mr. Chairman, technically,
4	there is no new business, however, there is a
5	message that came in for Dorval Carter yesterday
6	that I would be remiss not to give him because the
7	person who called me will probably call me until I
8	die and remind me that so Garland Armstrong
9	called from Des Moines, Iowa yesterday and he
10	wanted to make sure that I said to Dorval Carter
11	that he and his wife love you, that they are proud
12	of you, and rock on, black brother, rock on.
13	CHAIRMAN BARCLAY: Since there is no
14	further business to come before the Board, may I
15	have a motion to adjourn the Chicago Transit Board
16	meeting of January 15th, 2025?
17	DIRECTOR REQUEJO: So moved.
18	DIRECTOR LEE: Second.
19	MS. GREENLEE: It's been moved by Director
20	Requejo, seconded by Director Lee that the meeting
21	be adjourned.
22	We'll take a roll call vote.
23	Director Jha.
24	DIRECTOR JHA: Yes.
